What's been happening in front and behind the scenes this year? Wind Takes Toll on FH Older Trees

It is becoming a familiar sight. After each wind storm, (and they are frequent as of late) heavy, thick branches, fallen trees and uprooted



trees can be spotted throughout FH. According to Arborists, the age of some of our trees is part of reason the trees are coming down. Root rot and disease found in some of the really old trees, can cause even the slightest wind to topple them.

Long-time resident, Edith Howson of the 8100 block of San Benito Way, decided to take action before the over-sized, diseased tree in her front yard fell on someone. The tree was a beautiful tree. Providing a lovely canopy and welcome shade in the summer to that particular section of the block. Howson began to worry about the tree given the surge in wind storms in the Dallas area. Aware of the disease in the tree's base, she knew it would just be a matter of time before it fell. She lay awake at night worrying it might

land on someone, or their, car producing disastrous results. This past week, she hired a crew to take the frontyard landmark tree down. All that remains is a pit of sawdust and an irrigation wire used to water the tree.

Arborists advise all FH residents to know their trees. Find out the age of the trees on your large lots. Recruit help from Arboretum specialists, books, the Forest Hills Garden Club, internet, etc. so you are in the know.

A good majority of the trees in FH Proper are large and looming. Their branches are heavy and dangerous when they suddenly snap or drop to the ground. When storms strike, they can

kill or maim and do significant damage to home and property. Being informed is your best weapon of defense. Create a safe haven around your home. The FHNA





does not want to see a rash of trees being cut down out of fear, but hope neighbors will get informed and act accordingly. Information provided below to help you in assessing the risk of trees on your property.

Town Hall Meeting Recap

Forest Hills Association's first town hall meeting of 2009 was held March 3 at Sanger Elementary. Leon Russell opened the meeting attended by roughly 30 residents with a quick overview of significant activities since the Fall 2008 annual meeting and elections.

Mentioned were the fact that a budget for 2009 had been adopted and that a good response to dues statements was needed in order to support the budget. The soon to be available directory will represent a significant update from the directory last published in 2005. There has been considerable success selling advertising to help fund the cost of the directory. People were encouraged to check out the recent improvements to the FHA website and to send additional suggestions to the webmaster, Sharon Hill. Attention was called to the new Forest Hills rock wall and metal sculpture signage at Breezewood and Garland Road, as well as the neighborhood street sign toppers the cost for which was graciously donated.

Invited speaker Gloria Tarpley spoke briefly about the history and purpose of the Garland Road Vision Initiative ["GRV"]. This organization of residents, neighborhood associations, businesses, the Doctor's Hospital, the Dallas Arboretum, and others are working with the city of Dallas, DART, the Texas Dept. of Transportation, etc. to develop an overall plan for development along Garland Road. The GRVI organization retained a professional consultant to assist their efforts and expects to have a preliminary plan ready around May 1st, 2009. The concept of involving residents and businesses with governmental entities in arriving at a coordinated, overall plan for community development is a brand new approach to community planning. It replaces the usually separate, uncoordinated activities typically undertaken by City Planning Departments and other governmental organizations. Because of GRVI's unique approach, there is widespread outside interest in seeing how well it works.

Ms. Tarpley explained to Town Hall attendees that the FRVI plan will include recommendations regarding landscaping and signage and other approaches that would create a sense of connection up and down Garland Road. An official website will be up by the summer and there will be series of Town Hall meetings to which all, including FHA residents, will be invited.

According to Judy Whalen and Sgt. Dillon, overall crime in FH was down 30% in 2008, likely because FHA increased its patrols to 9 in 2008. Calls to 911 average about 30 per month. Burglaries in the FH neighborhood are down. But significant to Sgt. Dillon was the unexpectedly high number of convicted felons stopped in FH during 2008.

Attendees were curious about where to find the crime statistics for the FH neighborhood. The crime statistics for our two Dallas Police Dept. reporting areas, #1172 and #1173, can be found on the Dallas police website: <u>www.dallaspolice.net</u>, select the Public Access link, agree to the terms, and then on the Public Access page which comes up, enter either 1172 or 1173 for the reporting area and select reporting dates of interest. Residents can also check with FH Security at <u>FHSPenp@aol.com</u>.

Attendees asked whether FH residents needed to upgrade their door locks in response to the TV news channel story on "lock bumping." Sgt. Dillion indicated that most burgulars aren't that sophisticated and prefer to just knock on your door and, if you don't answer, kick it in and then close it quickly behind them before neighbors have time to look out and see if something is wrong. For that reason, his advice was that the FH residents should invest in deadbolts with at least a three inch throw into a solid stud to make it hard to kick the door in. He also commented that while it is legal for door-to-door salesmen to operate in FH, they cannot legally solict after sundown.

Attendees were encouraged to call the FHA Security Patrol and take advantage of a free service they offer which is to check your house while you are gone on vacation.

Attendees asked about when the permit ends for the California Night Club which owns the Far West club at Gaston and Garland Road. It will end in 2013.

Finally, Barbara Michaels mentioned that this year's Annual Garden Tour is set for Sunday, May 17 from 11 a.m. to 5 p. m.

Are Signs the Equivalent of Litter to Some?



Apparently so. The editor's desk continues to receive incidences of neighbor against neighbor visits, confrontations, hearty discussions, etc., about signs. You see them. They are all over the place in FH Proper and to some, it is becoming a real eye-sore. The signs represent clutter to some, no less than garbage in the front yards, telephone poles, and medians. We think most of you will admit, this is a problem within our neighborhood.

FYI — The City of Dallas is on top of this sort of thing. They have an ordinance stipulating signage allowed within neighborhoods. Bottom line, you have 7 days to "do your thing." The City's position is this: The FHNA has the right to post any sign in the median exactly 7 days prior to the event stated on the sign. For instance, if we are planning an annual event, such as a Christmas party, the FHNA is permitted to place signs in the medians for up to 7 days. If we exceed the time limit for posted signage, the signs are confiscated by the city and we are assessed a fine of up to \$250.00. We are not rich enough to afford such fines, so the FHNA volunteers are sensitive to the time frame and hustle to get the signs picked up after an event.

Just last week, one neighbor noticed a person removing signs. The two began to talk and the sign picking neighbor expressed anger at the number of signs. In his mind, taking them down on his own was the answer. We are seeing more and more of this. Neighbors are tired of seeing ad after ad everywhere as they drive to work, leaving FH.

In another case, yellow flyers advertising the loss of pet, were posted randomly and stayed visible for over 3 weeks. Heavy tape was used to post them. It rained, the yellow flyers melted and the glue

stuck to the signs post leaving a mess. No one came by to clean them up. Again, angry FH neighbors began taking matters into their own hands. Several have come down, the dog's owner was contacted to come clean up the rest.

Is there a solution? We all have rights. There is no law against trying to find your lost pet. In lieu of signpost litter, the FHNA asks that you use of Animal Alert! website program. If you are having work done on your home, you can post the ad sign for your contractor for 7 days, then promptly remove it. As for events, yard sales, etc., every time you opt to place a sign, you are at risk of neighbors taking it down and disposing of it. Our goal is to be fair-minded and neighborly. No entity, the city or any other agency has the time to oversee this issue 24/7. Therefore, we have to find solutions on our own.

Emergency Response Vehicles Blocked by Cars

Imagine it's your FH home burning. You hear the sirens coming and minutes are precious when a fire is raging. This was the case only recently for one FH homeowner. Fortunately (not in the case of loss), the fire raged on a Sunday. The streets were clear of contractor vehicles normally lining FH's entrance streets on any given workday. The problem of contractor work trucks blocking the streets was brought to our attention by concerned neighbors from the frontage streets of San Fernando, and Forest Hills.



Problem: The trucks line the streets on both sides as pictured here below. Because of the depth perception in the photo, you cannot see just how narrow the slip is between these vehicles. A large fire truck or ambulance (because of the width of the vehicle), could not successfully pass. When minutes count, no emergency response vehicle should have to turn around and find another passage to the emergency location.

Solution: Notice to all homeowners whose homes are being renovated, updated, etc. Please advise all vehicles associated with construction jobs to

figure out a strategy to park, keeping the roadway completely clear of obstruction should an emergency arise.

Our first line of defense is to work with neighbors and their contractors to ensure successful participation. It is easy to do and the contractors we have spoken with are very aminable to our requests.

The FHNA has reported the problem to local fire officials, police, and ambulance services units giving them heads up about the parking.

We anticipate complete compliance by considerate neighbors, so when any of us needs help . . . help can reach us when minutes count.

Door to Door

You may have noticed the increase in door to door solicitation, likely due to the slow economy.

Some of the solicitors are legitimate; some not. How do you know? First ask to see their solicitor's permit, which they are required to have by the city. Also use your gut feeling. Please do not allow anyone into your home.

If you do not like door to door sales, you could put up a no solicitation sign on your door, which usually is not a deterrent or just not answer the door.

Call 911 If they do not have a permit or for some reason you feel uneasy and are suspicious of a solicitor. If it is a non-emergency, we suggest beginning your 911 call with "I do not believe this to be an emergency, however I want to report suspicious activity/a suspicious person." Be sure to get all the identifying details, especially a license number if you can do it safely. It is not illegal to solicit door to door, but it is illegal after dark. Please report that as well.

Do Not Be Afraid . . .

Do not be afraid to CALL 911 any time to report suspicious activity or when needing emergency help. Do not attempt to contact our neighborhood security personnel until you have called 911 first. If one of our FHSP-ENP police officers is on duty, he/she will hear the 911 call on their radio and have the opportunity to handle the situation in seconds. Calling 911 is the best way for our officers to know quickly. Secondly, please follow up with the FH Security <u>FHSPENP@aol.com</u> or 214-535-2077 so it can be placed in the police logbook. So often crimes have been solved in follow up situations by our officers.

Communication is one of the best ways to fight crime.

Brown Recluse Spider Bites FH Woman in Home



Now here is a story you don't hear every day. We received a call from a dear neighbor who sounded literally terrible on the phone. She is one of FH's favorite seniors.

Two Brown Recluse spiders were

found in her home. One, under the sheets of her bed near her feet. The second, in her bathroom, where she was bitten.

These spiders are extremely dangerous, and their bites can be fatal if not treated in time.

Fortunately, Doris had a brown recluse spider kit and was able to treat the bite within 4 hours. Still, she remains very ill from the effects of such a bite.

This is the first report of this spider inside an FH home. Please familiarize yourself with this species of spider and how to treat a bite.



Coyote Kills Cat in FH

8300 Santa Clara block captain, Pat Colacecchi found cat's head torn off in her back yard this past weekend. There have been

more and more coyote sightings in our neighborhood. Forest HIIIs is a safe place for them to hang out. Unfortunately we have to rely on animal control to take care of the problem. You could try to trap a coyote, but once you trap it, you have to hand it over to animal control to take away because Texas Wildlife regulations state you cannot transport live coyotes.

Just make your neighbors aware there have been more and more evidence of them here. Keep your pets, especially small dogs and cats inside at night for their safety.
