Presidential Thoughts ...

Season's greetings. As we approach the upcoming holidays and the end of the year, it is only natural to reflect on what has been accomplished. A complete list would be too lengthy. But some items include, of course, the fact that the social activities normally associated with seasonal and patriotic holidays continued successfully. Both the Spring and Fall General Meetings enjoyed the highest number of attendees ever seen in many recent years of general meetings, and many favorable comments were received afterwards. Our two triangular median gardens were cleaned up. Lighting was restored to the Keller Circle tree.

FHNA President FHA's physical assets were moved to a larger storage facility. A virtual electronic file cabinet was created on the internet for storage of all FHA files. Historical FHA records were scanned and placed in that virtual file cabinet, as will all future records. Officers and committee chairman began transitioning to generic AOL email addresses which will be passed down to each new generation of this organization's leaders. The bylaws were amended. Further amendments are in the works. Significant updates were made to the FHA website, to which the FHA bylaws were also added. FHA organization positions which, in the past, stubbornly resisted being filled were finally filled, as were some newly created positions. This is especially significant because it means that new ideas and fresh ways of thinking are being brought to the organization's table. New accounting software replaced a variety of different software packages and techniques for keeping FHA accounting records. This new software consolidates all the accounting record keeping into one place and will make the accounting process more accurate, quick and efficient. The FH directory database continues to be maintained and current, ready for use in publishing the new FHA directory due this coming spring.

Overlaid on these and many other activities too numerous to mention above have been the considerable time and effort devoted to getting the City to clean up after the February snowstorm damage to our trees and, following that, the efforts to clean up our neighborhood alleys in response to Sanitation complaints about their condition. Much has already been said about both of these subjects in prior newsletters. Suffice it to say that the alley cleanup effort is ongoing. Although FH is close to finally being able to say that the neighborhood has done everything that Sanitation and City Code requires and is entitled to receive alley trash pickup service (or have it restored where lost), we aren't quite there yet because some homeowners are either unwilling or physically unable to take care of that portion of the alley for which they are legally responsible. Dallas City Code Compliance is sending letters to those homeowners. Hopefully, that will be sufficient to fix the remaining problem areas. To their credit, many homeowners have approached me during this campaign and volunteered to help anyone who needs help with their portion of an alley. Those folks are to be commended for their sense of community spirit. What is needed now is for those in need to ask for help.

As your FHA board of directors and volunteers all from the neighborhood meet to prepare a budget for the coming New Year and plan next year's projects, know that we have the neighborhood's best interests at heart and will do the very best we can, for you, our neighbor. Thank you for your support and Happy Holidays!!!

Spc.Jordan T. Knight, a life long resident of Forest Hills, graduated from the U.S. Army Basic Combat Training at Ft. Sill, Oklahoma on August 13, 2010. Colonel Robert Ford was a B24 pilot in the Pacific with the 90th Bomb Group, "Jolly Rogers". After WW11, he enrolled in the University of Texas, Austin where he met and married Elna Faye "Rocky" Roquemore. He served in the Korean Conflict after graduation. In 1953, he returned to Dallas pursuing his CPA career. Robert and Rocky arrived in Forest Hills in 1964, built a new home, where they raised 3 children. For 22 years Robert was business director of Dallas Water Utilities. The colonel served as secretary-treasurer of his bomb group, was a life member and past commander of MOWW and ROA, life member of VFW Post 6796, member of MOAA, Daedalians, and Caterpillar Club.

Our neighbor, a war hero, was laid to rest in DFW National Cemetery.

Dallas Garage & Estate Sale Listings

Effective October 1, 2010 a Garage Sale Permit is required Before conducting a garage sale.

Why do I have to register my garage sale?

Registration is required to better regulate and enforce the garage sale provisions and promote clean, safe and vibrant neighborhoods.

How soon do I have to register?

You must register the week of your garage sale. You must have documentation of your registration prior to conducting your garage sale. You are subject to a citation if you are unable to produce documentation during your garage sale event.

How much does a permit cost?

The Garage Sale permit fee is \$15.00.

Where can I get a permit?

Currently permits may be obtained at one of the following City facilities:

- 1. Restaurant/Bar Inspections, 7901 Goforth Rd., Dallas, TX 75238
- 2. Code Compliance Administration, 3112 Canton St., Dallas, TX 75226
- 3. Dallas Animal Services, 1818 Westmoreland Rd., Dallas, TX 75212

Registration sites and online options will be added sbefore spring 2011.

How many consecutive days can I hold the garage sale?

For a duration not to exceed three consecutive calendar days.

How many times a year can I have a garage sale?

Not more than two occasional sales during any 12 month period.

May I place items for sale on my lawn and driveway?

The sale must be inside a building or garage, or on the patio.

Where can I place garage sale signs in my neighborhood?

You can not place more than one sign, not to exceed two square feet, upon the lot where the sale is taking place. Any other signs at any locations remote from the sale property are not permitted.

Does the City provide free advertising?

Yes. At the point of sale we can add your location to our website or you may list your sale on the following web link <u>http://garagesale.dallascityhall.com/AddLogin.jsp</u>.

Garland Road Vision Status Update

As you know, the Garland Road Vision study has been under way for some time. You will recall that the study encompasses the encapsulation of what the vision for development can be for the Garland Road corridor from 635 on one end, to the Gaston/Garland/Grand intersection on the other. Over the course of several months of meetings with neighbors and all interested parties, as well as considerable study of the area, its traffic patterns and already existing residential, park, and commercial areas, the consulting firm working on the project is almost finished with the final draft of the study. The Plan Review Committee is reviewing the final draft, and it is hoped that the study, its projections, vision, and conclusions will be finalized to be presented to the City Planning Commission and the Dallas City Council by the end of 2010. Appliance Rebate Program

The State of Texas received more than \$23 million in stimulus funds from the United States Department of Energy to create a program that provides rebates to consumers who purchase energy efficient household appliances. The first round of the "Texas Trade Up Appliance Rebate Program" began last April and almost \$12 million was distributed in appliance rebates.

Over \$10 million in rebates remains unclaimed so a second program will officially kick off this winter. The dates for the rebate program have not yet been finalized. Due to difficulties with the online and phone reservation system, changes have been implemented for the winter program that will hopefully make this program and appliance rebates more accessible for Texans trying to cut electric costs.

The appliance rebate programs are designed to provide rebates when a consumer replaces an older, yet still functional appliance, and purchases a new, energy efficient, ENERGY STAR® or CEE (Consortium for Energy Efficiency) qualified appliance. Energy efficient products help consumers cut costs on their electric bills and increase energy conservation.

Eligibility

This program is strictly for Texas residents with a valid Texas address. Eligible appliances for the Energy Efficient Appliance Rebate Program include refrigerators, freezers, dishwashers, air conditioners, clothes washers, hot water heaters, and more. These are the same categories from the April program, however rebate amounts will probably change slightly. Additional details and guidelines will be released later this year.

How & When to Receive a Rebate

Since the rebate period has not yet been set for this winter you may want to sign up to receive the latest updates by email from the Comptroller's office by going here:<u>https://service.govdelivery.com/service/subscribe.html?code=TXCOMPT_545&origin=http://www.texaspowerfulsmart.org/rebate/faqs.php</u> or you can follow the program on Twitter: <u>http://twitter.com/powerfulsmart</u>.

Unlike the first round of the program in April, there will not be a reservation period through phone calls or a website. Instead, rebates will be available on a first come, first served basis. Once an appliance is purchased all you need to do is fill out and mail in your rebate form. It is important to note that previously purchased appliances are not eligible for this rebate. The rebate only applies to appliances purchased once the program begins.

Your purchase must be from an in-store Texas contractor or retailer because online purchases are not eligible this round. Rebates may be used for appliances currently on layaway if final payment occurs after the program has started. Rebates can also be stacked and combined with other rebates or discounts from manufacturers and retailers.

Due to concerns over fraud, retailers are not allowed to submit a rebate for a consumer. Texas has also limited the number of rebates per person. If you have any additional questions or would like more details as the program nears, you may want to check the official rebate website at http://www.texaspowerfulsmart.org/.

Safe and Happy Holidays To All!

Good News! 2010 Jan-Oct home break-ins were down 50% from last year! However the number of vehicles stolen rose from 2008. Continue to be vigilant. See Something — Say Something — Call 911.

LOCK your car, TAKE your keys and HIDE your belongings.

Alert from Forest Hills neighbor: "Both of our SUVs were "rummaged through" overnight. I say "rummaged through" instead of broken into, because unfortunately we

left our cars unlocked (something we rarely do). When we went to leave this morning, it was evident that someone had been searching for something in each of our cars. Papers and items from the console and glove box where thrown everywhere but fortunately for us, nothing was taken. We had guests staying with us, but their car was not touched — because it was LOCKED!"





Tips:

Do not leave keys to vehicle inside car especially in plain view.

Do not leave vehicle unlocked or windows down (even in your driveway).

Do not park on street (if you have a garage, use it).

Do not park in areas of poor visibility (not lighted or hidden from public view).

Do not leave vehicle running and unattended.

Do not leave any articles that are visible on seats (anything might appear to be valuable).

Reasons for Car Theft:

- 1. Joyrides (often juveniles)
- 2. Re-selling the vehicle for parts. (Often when broken down, the sum of the parts is worth more than the vehicle.)
- 3. To use vehicle to commit another crime (untraceable to them).

Home Security Tips:

This year's holiday season promises to be as busy and wonderfully hectic as ever — shopping, gift-giving, decorating and celebrating with friends and family. Unfortunately, it's an equally busy time of year for home burglars. It's no surprise that with homes full of gifts and packages waiting on porches, this is the time when home and car burglaries rise.

• Lock your doors; Turn your alarm on.

• Don't flaunt expensive gifts to burglars by leaving empty gift boxes from your new computer, flat-screen TV or DVD player on the curb. Break down the boxes and place in large garbage bags to conceal the items. Better yet, take boxes to a recycling center.

• Piles of unchecked mail and newspapers can tip off burglars to an empty house. If traveling during the holidays, ask a neighbor to help keep up your homes' appearances so it doesn't have that vacant look about it. Ask them to park their car in your driveway.

• If you're a current subscriber to the Forest Hills Security Program, you receive the benefit of a police officer checking your home when you are out of town. fhspenp@aol.com to request a house check form.

• The enemies of the burglar are time and attention. The longer it takes to enter and the more noise he makes increase his chances of being seen and caught. Homes not easily and quickly broken into are most often bypassed for easier targets.

• Make it hard for them with layers of protection. Not one security measure does the trick. The more lines of defense we have, the less the odds are of being a victim.

The Forest Hills Security Program is a protective outer layer, preventing thugs from entering our neighborhood in the first place; deterring them from going further to test your security system, to penetrate your safe room or to feed your watch dog.

Tips From a Neighbor

Got squirrels in your attic or under the house? Mice? Racoons? Other assorted mammals? There is a simple, inexpensive, sure-fired way to get rid of them that does not involve poison, traps, or tedious searching for cracks, gaps, and holes that need to be plugged. Go to an electronics store (e.g. Frye's), purchase two plastic strobe lights (\$15.00 each), place them in your attic (or crawl space), plug them in, adjust the strobe light frequency so they are out of step with each other and wait. In about three days, all such critters should vanish. If you have a light but no electrical outlet in your attic, purchase a socket adapter from a hardware store (\$1.98), unscrew the attic light bulb, screw in the adapter, screw the attic light bulb back in, and then plug the strobes in to the adapter. Forest Hills Ranch House Star of American Institute of Architects Dallas Tour of Homes



Josette "Josy" Collins' rambling Forest Hills ranch house is a lot like she is: worldly, connected to nature, thoroughly modern.

Many expected them to bulldoze the modest dwelling and build something grander on the sprawling corner lot. Collins is too much of a purist for that. "It was important for us to keep the original footprint out of respect for the neighborhood," says the tawny blonde, well-toned from morning runs beside the lake.

Seen today, the home's low-slung stance remains unchanged, but the exterior is now adorned with Texas-modern details such as a bronze front entry (Collins' bank-vault door) and standing-seam metal roof. New dry-stacked stone walls replace a former mishmash of salmon-hued bricks and white stucco. The relocated front walkway is shaded by an extended arbor clad in wisteria to dapple the light.

No worries; Collins' latest acquisition is already perched in the front yard and ready for take-off. The gleaming stainless steel bird by Dallas sculptor Brad Oldham was a gift from Collins' husband, who bought it for "his favorite chick."

Forest Hills Past Tense

Excerpts from <u>Land is the Cry</u>, by Susanne Starling a book about the founder of our community, Warren Angus Ferris.

In 1839, Warren Angus Ferris (1810-1873) was a pioneer, who surveyed the Three Forks of the Trinity; surveying most of the land east of the Trinity-including most of Kaufman, Van Zandt, Hunt, Rockwall, Dallas, Collin and Denton Counties. His surveys determined the line of streets and roads that shaped the future urban Dallas County. Many believe he has never received the recognition he deserves and should be remembered as the "Father of Dallas County".

In 1849 Warren Angus Ferris settled down after years of surveying to farming east of White Rock Creek within the borders of what is now Forest Hills. His log cabin stood on the eastern edge of a large grove of trees about 200 yards east of the present junction of St. Francis Drive and Garland Rd., where wild persimmon and native pecan trees flourished. A hundred peach, pear, plum, and cherry trees were planted by Ferris for his orchard. He had six head of horses, 30 head of cattle, 80 head of hogs, 2 dogs, 3 cats, 200 chickens and hives of bees. 85 acres of his property was cultivated where he harvested wheat, oats, corn and cotton. The thickets of White Rock Creek provided some of the best hunting. Everywhere deer, turkeys and prairie chickens were thick as ants on the hills and bear, panthers, wolves and wildcats kept to the river and creek bottoms. Buffalo, wild mustangs and maverick cattle roamed the grassland west of Dallas on Grapevine Prairie. On the creek near where the spillway of White Rock Lake is presently located, Ferris built a gristmill. He fished in White Rock creek and Ash Creek that runs along Barbaree now.

In the 1860's notorious Belle Star was often seen riding into this wooded area we now call Forest Hills. During the civil war and reconstruction, a little community called Rinehardt grew up along the Old National Road, between Dallas and Duck Creek (Garland). It was here Ferris' neighbors gathered for impromptu horse races, a common entertainment in a community where several farmers like Ferris raised fast horses. With boots pounding on rough plank floors, they clapped to lively fiddle music and danced till late hours at winter sociables. Folks came from surrounding counties to the shady White Rock Creek banks to hear three to five sermons a day by Methodist circuit riders. They gathered for funerals. Ferris' family cemetery (St. Francis & San Cristobal) grew as Warren allowed neighbors' loved ones to be buried there.



Warren Ferris made his last survey for R.C. Buckner in 1871, and continue to give instruction to many young men like John R. West. Young boys, who encountered the short, stocky fellow with the Van Dyke beard and piercing blue eyes, were fascinated by the old man who was willing to thrill them with his stories of frontier adventure, told in his cultured diction.



Ferris died in 1873 and was buried in the Warren Angus Ferris Cemetery. In 1988 it received a Texas Historical Marker, bringing long-overdue attention to the accomplishments of this pioneer Dallas settler.

After the homestead was deserted by 1875, the old log cabin here became a stopover for drifters, as did the vacant Ferris farmhouse he had built later. Some said the James boys (gang) stayed there and Sam Bass and his gang holed up in the farmhouse prior to their robbery of the Texas & Pacific train in Mesquite in 1878. The house was destroyed by fire around 1909.
