

### Spotlight on Sanger

#### Sanger teacher named Dallas ISD 2018-2019 Elementary Teacher of the Year

Elisa Morrissey is this year's Dallas ISD 2018-2019 Elementary Teacher of the Year. She is a 4th grade teacher at Alex W. Sanger Elementary School.

In her acceptance speech, Mrs. Morrissey shared two beliefs that have sustained her throughout her 19 years as an educator.

The first is DETERMINATION and GRIT. "We must never give up on ourselves and our children. Our students come from different socioeconomic and cultural backgrounds and they have demonstrated the true meaning of having grit. They show up in your classroom waiting to be challenged even after life has thrown them many curve balls. If they show up, I show up no matter what, having high expectations of them."

Her second belief is demonstrating VULNERABILITY. "I teach the mechanics and craft of writing daily, and I make intentional and unintentional mistakes to demonstrate humility and that I am not perfect, nor do I expect them to be. I let them know that failure is a part of learning and growing. It does not define a person's worth. Showing them that even when we don't have it all together, we are still good enough."

Parent Dora Hornick, who's had two sons taught by Morrissey, praises the teacher for her dedication of bringing out every child's best qualities. "Before entering her class, both of my

sons dreaded writing, but Mrs. Morrissey worked her magic and they both enjoy writing and find it fun," said Hornick. (From www.thehub.dallasisd.org)

### **Animal Alert! Works!**

#### But we need your help to do so.

The more residents of Forest Hills that sign up for Animal Alert! emails, the more people that can help unite a lost or found animal with its family. If you have not signed up yet to receive our email alerts, please do so now.

It is easy - just email info@lfhanimalalert.org and ask to be on the list.

We do not sell our list and you can get off at any time by just emailing us. Each home that signs on is like adding another piece of the puzzle in helping with a lost or found pet.

You can also help by being SURE your pets are wearing a collar with up-to-date tags and are microchipped.

#### *www.flhanimalalert.org* "Help us help you get your pet home safely if it should get lost."



#### What to do if you lose a pet:

1. Contact Animal Alert! with pet info, a picture, your contact number and the time/location your pet was last seen.

2. Contact the microchip company that your pet is microchipped with.

- 3. Post on *www.Nextdoor.com* with above information.
- 4. Report to Dallas Animal Services at daslost@dallascityhall.com.
- 5. Go to *www.Petharbor.com* to search for your pet online.
  - a. Choose type of animal (dog or cat or other).
  - b. Choose your city shelter (Dallas Animal Services).
  - c. Continue to check this site until your pet is found.
  - d. Click "Register Your Lost Pet" to fill out the form online.
- 6. Post your pet on Lost and Found pages on Facebook.
- 7. Hang posters in your area with a picture of your pet and a contact number.
- 8. Check with vets and groomers in your area.

#### What to do if you find a pet:

1. Secure the pet so it will be safe.



- 2. Contact Animal Alert with pet info, location found and a picture. (email - *info@lfhanimalalert.org*)
- 3. Take the pet to the nearest vet to get scanned for a microchip.
- 4. Post on Nextdoor.com with above information.
- 5. Send information to Dallas Animal Services at

6. Check Lost and Found Facebook pages.

7. Hang posters in your area with a picture of the found pet with your contact number.

#### FRI / FHNA Column Highland Road

#### Hi neighbors!

One mission of the Ferguson Road Initiative is to advocate on behalf of the community. We work with the City of Dallas to lobby for specific improvements or help prioritize items on the City's Needs Inventory. Ideally, when bond allocations are made, such items get funded. One significant current project is the improvement of Highland Road. The long-planned updates will be between the Ash Creek bridge (near Primrose Senior apartments) and the Ferguson Rd. intersection.



Highland Rd was first identified needing improvement in 1998 and was one of FRI's first community mobilization projects. A child was killed walking to Bayles School in the mid-1990's and the community targeted the reconstruction of Highland Rd. from Jim Miller to the RR tracks as a safety need. The first phase, from Ferguson to Jim Miller, was approved on the 1998 bond program and completed in 2005. The next phase is slated for Highland Rd. from Ferguson to the Primrose Senior Development. With families, youth and senior pedestrians using this road, it is extremely dangerous. A few years ago, a makeshift sidewalk was installed to help disabled seniors walk to Ferguson Rd. Now with the White Rock Hills Park construction beginning, it's logical that the city would address this road condition. Nothing has been done to improve this road for decades other than filling potholes. FRI consistently pushed for a safer reconstructed Highland Road – and it is now occurring.

I spoke with Chris Turner-Noteware, PE, the Assistant Director for the City of Dallas Department of Public Works. She confirmed that designs finalized this past year include; sidewalks, bike paths/lanes, integration to the new White Rock Hills Neighborhood Park and Dallas Trail System, nature friendly lighting, proper drainage, green features and designated roadside parking areas for the WRH Park.

For this project, City engineers are coordinating with the Park and Recreation Dept., to integrate the WRH Park and future Recreation Center, and with Dallas Water Utilities to simultaneously replace old water and sewer pipes and accommodate future needs to avoid damaging the new roadway and sidewalk in the future. The City is waiting on bidding and construction of the Highland Rd. project until the Lakeland Dr. bridges are complete – they have had some challenges due to utility conflicts around the bridges nearing completion. The Lakeland bridges should hopefully be completed in April, depending on weather and other unforeseen conditions. They have had some challenges due to utility conflicts. The City plans to solicit bids for the Highland Rd project in February and anticipates construction beginning in late Spring/ early Summer 2019. Construction may be a yearlong endeavor. Construction begins late Spring / early Summer 2019 and may take up to a year. In the last column I touched on the official ground breaking of the forthcoming White Rock Hills Park, near the corner of Ferguson Rd. and Highland Rd. In a future column, I'll share the Park plans and an update on the City's progress.

#### **Exciting Garden Project at Sanger**

As you drive by the school at San Leandro and St. Francis you may notice changes happening. Many years ago, a Girl Scout troop established a garden near the parking lot at the rear of the school. It must have been beautiful at some point, but over the years it has fallen into disuse and disarray. A new garden area was established behind the school which has been lovingly tended by students, teachers and volunteers. This garden is now being moved back to the original garden area in preparation for the construction which will be taking place at the school in the near future (no dates set yet). The new garden has been planned by Dawn Cleaves, with a number of parents and students working to bring it to life.





A big benefit of this project will be increased "curb appeal" for the school.

One of our Forest Hill neighbors, **Maria Stanley**, is working on this project. She would love to get other Forest Hill residents involved! I

know there are many experienced gardeners in our neighborhood and your help would be invaluable. Some practical needs are: two metal benches for the students, 2 shovels with pointed tips, 2 pronged hoes/pitchfork style, and an 80-gallon compost tumbler. If you

#### **Spotlight on a Forest Hills Teenager** MAX HARRINGTON RALSTON

Forest Hills wasn't Max Ralston's first home (it was Lakewood), but he got here as soon as he could. That was in 2004, when he was 3. Max has loved Forest Hills. The large yards, the tall trees, the friendly neighbors and the plentiful dogs (sorry, Max is not much of a cat person). Max is now a Junior at The Shelton School. He is a good student and is a member of the National Honor Society. His primary extra-curricular avocations are cross-country and track. You may, in fact, see Max and his dad, Mark, around the neighborhood on their training runs. You can tell the two apart pretty easily. Max is the one in front—way in front. Last year, Max qualified for the district and regional meets in all his events: the 800 meter (half mile), the 1600 meter (one mile), and the 3200 meter (two miles). His goal for the spring track season is to run faster and to qualify for state in all of his events.

Max is also a long-time member of a local Boy Scout troop and is now working on reaching the rank of Eagle Scout. Scouting has given Max the chance to go on numerous campouts and learn outdoor skills. His most challenging scouting adventure has been a week-long back country hiking trip as the Philmont Scout Range in the Sangre de Cristo Mountains of New Mexico.



Max also has worked to give back to the community and to others. Through his Boy Scout troop, he has helped with meals for the Austin Street Shelter. He has also worked on many of the annual canned food drives organized by the Boy Scouts. At Shelton, Max is a member of Chargers for Change, an organization that devotes time to various community service projects.

Max has spent the last several summers volunteering in various countries. In Costa Rica, he helped with a sea turtle conservation project. In Peru, Max hiked Machu Picchu—this after providing significant service hours in the local communities. This summer Max will travel to Thailand where he will study marine and rain forest conservation and volunteer for projects that benefit the rain forest. He hopes to meet up with his sister who is teaching English in Thailand.

Max believes that the safe environment and generous community in Forest Hills he has experienced has allowed him to grow into an involved member of his Shelton community. He hopes as he goes on to college life that he continues to be a person who gives back. Finally, he is learning how to drive (take cover, residents!) and hopes very much to get his driver's license soon.




