

The President's Letter

Greetings Neighbors!

I hope everyone is coping well with our unprecedented times. We are all still impacted by Covid-19 and watching closely the civil unrest in our city and nation, which his printing is still growing. However, the FHNA continues to focus on our own neighborhood needs, and to promote the well-being of Forest Hills as best we can.

The FHNA Board had a Zoom meeting May $7^{\rm m}$ and planned out our budget for the remainder of 2020, May – Dec., using the amount already in the bank, about \$27,521.33. We allotted funds as follows:

Beautification - \$3500 to repair irrigation and enhance the landscape around the Forest Hills entrance sign at Breezewood and Garland Road. Tim Simmonds is the

lead. Fall General Meeting - \$1540. Nelighborhood Events - \$3500. Carrie Bevers and Sara Winwood are the leads. Newcomers - \$500. Membership Drive - \$500. Melissa Dermarkar is the lead on both. Animal Alert! - \$1000. Andie Comini is the lead. Forest HIII News - \$6428. (Paid for by advertising income in the Newsletter). Jane Ojeda and Andie Comini are the leads. Ongoing expenses (Storage, Median Maintenace, Utilities, Miscellaneous) - \$4,519. Bruce Borrett is the lead. About \$6,000 is to be kept in reserve through December.

Ron Balentine and Julie Dunn 8247 San Fernando Way

The driveway bed has been breathtaking this spring, with its chartreuse Sedum and Purple Larkspur. As Ron, my gardening husband reminds me, it takes 3 years to establish perennials. "First they sleep; then they creep and

finally they leap". Sure enough, it's been 3 years since we renovated that bed...

When we purchased it in 2014, we were excited about restoring the 1923 Dutch Colonial and its once award-winning garden. You could hardly see the house for the overgrown beds and encroaching forest, so Job #1 was to liberate its beautiful red stonework and its stained-glass windows from an ocean of Sea Oats and diseased Indian Hawthorns.

Next, we thinned out the overcrowded beds and planted the surplus Cast Iron plants, Japanese Aralias, Holly Ferns, Acanthus, Lenten Rose and Columbines around the yard. After repairing the old stone walkways, we began to add new accents like a favorite Smoke Tree, Japanese Maples, St. John's Wort, and Blue Black Salvia.

The current stay at home order has inspired our sidewalk bed renovation and new stone border. Here, perennials of varied heights and textures are taking hold. Our emerging landscape seems to eschew symmetry in favor of an eclectic balance. Here's to the gardeners! May every garden have at least one! Editors' note: We insisted Julie could highlight her own yard because it really does merit it!





Michael and Mary Simons 8359 Forest Hills Boulevard

The Simons yard was going to be on our garden tour this year. Strolling through it is like embarking on a plant safari. It is filled with plants the Simons have collected as they've traveled the Southwest.

Stately Bald Cypress trees line the sidewalk. Mock Oranges and Quince intermingle with Chinese Photinias to define the perimeter of the yard. Across the front of the house, an undulating perennial bed stretches all the way to the drive. The Coneflower and Brazilian Verbena gracing the front of the bed are easily visible from the street, but behind it an unexpected oasis exists. Here a stone path leads you past a huge Agave and other desert loving plants through a tumbling riot of Wine Cups, Pink Salvias, and Desert Verbenas. A journey to the Simons' front door feels like being on vacation.

This apparently carefree landscape actually requires a lot of work, "It seems like every seed that hits the ground grows," so beginning in late January, you'll find Mary in the garden almost every day, weeding, cleaning and culling through her plants. Her husband Michael helps on Fridays, the gardener comes once a week, but the bulk of labor is hers. "It's my hobby ... really a full-time job through April 30th, As she tends the garden through the summer, she begins to formulate her plan for next year. Maintenance and planning seem always to be on a gardener's mind.

IMMEDIATELY Call 911!


If our neighborhood officer is on duty, they will hear that 911 call and come IMMEDIATELY to your residence. The officer will also begin looking for the intruder as he drives to your home. If our patrol is NOT on duty, the Northeast DPD station will handle the incident as soon as possible in order of its importance and their workload.

This is why we NEED OUR OFFICERS on duty as many hours as we can afford.

The April Turn It Around and Get IN, or Back IN challenge was a success! 30 neighbors contributed to allow us to receive 100% of the \$5,000 offer in matched funds. A big THANK YOU to all who stepped up! But we are still not where we were in 2019!



So where are we now? How is your street doing?

Currently we have 49% of the neighborhood IN, compared to the end of 2019, when we had 62% participation. We are short 90 households from last year.

REMEMBER: With so many spending their summer on the home front this year, we have seen an increase in neighbors out and about walking and bike riding. Remember when out at night to please wear light colors, clothes/shoes with reflective patches and/or some type of light. And if walking your best buddy, your pup(s), please make sure they can be seen too. Be Seen - Be Safe

REMEMBER: When out walking your dog be respectful of our city streets and sidewalks along with your neighbors' yards by cleaning up after your dog and take the poop bag with you to toss in the trash once home

REMEMBER: Fireworks can be scary for dogs and cats. To avoid any missing pets this 4th of July please keep your animals indoors in a safe, secure location.

REMEMBER: Be sure your pets are wearing a collar with up-to-date ID tags and is micro-chipped. It is a great and permanent way to ensure your pet gets back to you safely!

REMEMBER: Heat stress or heatstroke in animals is also a concern during the hot summer months. Unlike humans, animals do not sweat they do lose some heat through their pads but not enough to keep them cool during the extremely hot temperatures. Panting is the main way they lose excess heat and moisture. Heat stress typically occurs when the pet's panting cannot cool the body to a reasonable temperature.

New regulations take effect July 1st to keep our city clean and clutter free.

 Maximum of 10 cubic yards of brush and bulky trash pickup once per month

(that's the equivalent of 10 household ovens).

 One yearly exception of 20 cubic yards of brush and bulky trash pickup allowed

(you must call 311 the week before set-out to claim your annual exception).

 Quantities set out above these limits will be measured, photographed, picked up and then billed on your City of Dallas Utilities bill.

A PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENT FROM MOTHER NATURE

Let's talk cardboard boxes. How do you dispose of yours? Mother Nature has been monitoring the last few months of bulk trash in Forest Hills, seeing pile after pile of cardboard boxes in embarrassing numbers.

Think about it

Everything we consume requires energy for its manufacture, transportation and disposal - energy usually produced by burning fossil fuels which release carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases. The decomposition of organic waste in a landfill produces methane gas, which traps over 21 times more heat in the atmosphere than CO2. That's what those cardboard boxes you out in bulk trash turn libulk trash

Waste prevention and recycling are powerful ways that each of us can use less energy and contribute to a healthy climate for our world and our Forest Hills.

Forest Hills' buying culture has been rapidly changing over the last few years. Killer perks like free, expedited shipping and simple returns encourage more people to shop online, more often. And now with the Covid-19 crisis, our computer has become our shopping cart 24-7. The convenience is amazing, but the waste is a shame. Choose the fewest packages option when you buy.

Work on your carbon footprint! Put your best foot forward and become environmentally conscious.

Use those big, blue, beautiful, city-provided recycling bins! Do your part and take the time to break down boxes to fit into your recycling bin for weekly pick-up. If it won't all fit, save it for the next week. Please don't send it to the landfill.

Wasting less and recycling more saves energy, saves money, and is one of the fastest, easiest, and most effective ways we can do our part here in Forest Hills.

I am depending upon you. Mother Nature



One benefit of this Coronavirus social distancing for me is a greater appreciation of the beauty of our Forest Hills neighborhood as I walk the tree lined streets. It gives me a chance to notice architecture, landscaping, and many details that I miss when I am driving.

Along with the beautifully manicured lawns and creative landscaping, I often notice in contrast the accumulation of dirt, leaves and debris along the curbs, streets, and alleys. Sadly, this makes its way into our storm sewers and ends up in White Rock Creek.

It would help if we all made sure that the street in front and the alley behind our homes were kept clean. It looks as though the landscape crew didn't complete their job. Since we do not have the luxury of city operated street sweepers, we should ask our grounds crews to please leave the curb and street as tidy as the yard. Remember, it is a violation of the city code to blow yard waste into the street which could result in a \$2,000 fine! The alleys should also be clean and accessible for repair trucks, security vehicles and those that have rear driveways.

zI believe it would be a small effort which would make a big difference in our wonderful neighborhood.



TIPS ON RECYCLING IN DALLAS

- 1. Size limits: Paper must be larger than a postcard and plastic larger than 2 inches but no larger than a 2-gallon container.
- 2. Shredded paper is NOT recyclable. It fouls up sorting machines and can't be handled.
- 3. Plastic bags are NOT recyclable. They also mess up the machinery used in the sorting process. Don't bag your recyclables in plastic bags for the bin. Put them in loose or in paper sacks. Plastic grocery store bags can be taken to many grocery stores for recycling.
- 4. Caps on bottles: Put them back on plastic bottles before recycling. Otherwise, they too will clog up the sorting works. Too small!
- 5. Pizza boxes? Well, the bottom is always too greasy and cannot be recycled since the paper part won't separate well. The top half, however, can be torn off and put in the big blue bin.
- 6. Cleanliness: A quick rinse for glass and plastics is fine. Paper is more problematical. Don't put any greasy food containers, etc., in the bin. A few spots are okay, but not a lot.

Ferguson Road Initiative Helps Address the COVID-19 Crisis in Far East Dallas

The FRI network is responding to the COVID-19 pandemic in the Far East Dallas area in two ways. First, we are marshalling information and resources to our largest and most vulnerable populations - Latino and African American families and senior citizens. Second, we are coordinating an area blood drive this summer in partnership with *Carter BloodCare*. FRI's work is so important now since our demographics include a 66% minority population and FRI's two City Council Districts, 7 and 9 that have the largest senior citizen population in Dallas.

An analysis by the University of Texas Health Science Center in Houston, in collaboration with the Dallas Morning News and KXAS-TV, has determined three (3) geographic pockets of need in our area: Ferguson/I-30, Ferguson/I-635, and Buckner/I-30. Residents here have higher rates of underlying conditions and if they contract COVID-19, are more likely to end up in the hospital, often in ICU's requiring a ventilator. These high-risk areas have many families living in affordable housing apartments. Information about services and resources available to them is often fragmented and difficult to find, so FRI is providing consolidated, easy-to-read information to directly connect them to emergency services and food painty providers who serve Far East Dallas.

In addition to communicating with our apartments and schools, FRI is working to create an efficient method to communicate with our neighborhoods to ask them for help by donating food, mobilizing volunteers, and offering cash contributions so area service providers can continue to provide emergency services that keep families fed and away from homelessness.

Although COVID-19 has caused us to focus on pressing fundamental community needs, we are still committed to the large-scale community-building projects finally being realized after decades of work that I have discussed before.
