

Close The Door on CRIME!!

DEAR SECURITY CHICK.

I leave my car doors unlocked, so if someone wants to break in, they won't cause any damage. My wife says I am asking for it. Should I lock my doors or not? **Doorman Dave**

DEAR DOORMAN DAVE.

I don't really want to take sides in this open and shut case. However, the police department recommends you always lock your vehicle door and without anything in sight.

An open door policy gives a thief the opportunity to rifle inside your car and trunk. Sometimes only coming up with a few coins. Other times papers with your identity or valuable things you forgot you left behind, like your phone, a wallet, an extra key to your car or house.

The latest trend in thievery is checking unlocked doors from one car to another, parked in driveways or on the street. Yes chances are your individual lost will not be that great, but your loss accumulated with others will be a great haul for the thief and will encourage them to keep coming back for more and possibly entice them to commit a greater crime.

If someone has gotten into your car and taken something, no matter how small, please call 911 to report the crime. With your help, this thief can be stopped. Close the door on crime!

Leaf Management from the Dirt Doctor

It's time for my annual attempt to pass on some common sense on leaf management. Enjoy the Fall color of course but plan the handling of the leaves and help spread the word to your friends and neighbors. Having the leaves hauled off to the landfill is the worst decision. It increases taxes, wastes time and money, throws away valuable soil-building organic material and looks terrible.

Here's a better way.

LEAF MANAGEMENT MISTAKES:

Leaves should never be blown, raked, put in bags and sent to the landfill

- Leaves should never be blown, raked, put into piles and set on fire.
- Leaves should never be blown, raked and put into the compost pile except as a last resort.
- Leaves should never be blown on to the neighbor's property or into the storm sewers or streets.

CORRECT LEAF MANAGEMENT:

The best leaf management is to mow and mulch them into the turf. Using a mulching mower is best but not essential. Turf can take a large volume of leaves before there is excess. Excess leaves would be when the lawn is about to be completely covered and smothered by the ground-up leaves. At the point of excess, the leaves should still be mulched on the lawn or driveway, and then raked, picked up and distributed as mulch in flower beds and vegetables gardens.

When no more mulch is needed in the flower and vegetable beds, the remaining leaves that have been ground-up by the lawnmower can be put into the compost pile. Add dry molasses to the beds and the compost pile to help the material break down and become humus more efficiently. Use it at about 20 lbs. per 1000 square feet.


Never under any circumstances should the leaves be removed from the site. They should either be mulched or composted. All cities should outlaw the city service of picking up leaves and grass clippings. If home and business owners have to recycle the organic matter on their property, then the landscapes are healthier, water runoff is reduced, and less tax money has to be allocated to picking up and managing leaves and other organic matter. Everybody wins!

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The Holiday season is here! Protect your Pets!

The holidays are quickly approaching - follow these simple rules to keep your holiday season safe and calm for both you and your furry friends!

FOOD: Remember turkey, side dishes and yummy deserts are meant for humans - not our furry friends.

DECORATIONS AND PLANTS: Table centerpieces are great additions to make our homes welcoming for the holiday season, but our pet's curiosity can get the best of them! Place all floral arrangements and other decorations up and away from the sight of curious dogs and cats. Candles create a welcoming environment, but be sure they are out of the way of any pets.

Make sure that your Christmas tree is safely and properly secured and ensure that breakable ornaments are placed high enough where curious noses cannot reach them. Always keep a close eye on your pet while they sniff around the Christmas tree! Pine needles from Christmas trees can also puncture pets' intestines and cause serious damage.

Some floral decorations look extra edible to animals and can lead to upset stomachs. Lilies are harmful for cats and pinecones can create a blockage or perforate the intestines of pets if eaten. Poinsettias, holly, and mistletoe can all cause irritation, vomiting and diarrhea in pets.

FIREWORKS: Place pets indoors during fireworks and ensure that they are adequately taken care of until the fireworks are over. Scared pets often try to find a way out of wherever they are. Be sure that your pets have a secure collar on with proper identification tags. If your pet is microchipped, always double check that their contact information in the registry database is up to date. This way, your pets can always get back home to you safely.

WINTER SAFETY: Even though it may not feel like winter, the slightest temperature drop can cause irritation to your pet's skin. Keep your pet's feet safe by wiping them off with a towel after coming in from outside. Wintertime is prime season for salty and sandy roads and antifreeze which can all cause harm to your pets. The best way to keep your pets safe and healthy during the fall and inter months is to keep them indoors as much as possible!

The holidays are a wonderful time to spend with family and friends – not in the emergency pet clinic! Be sure to follow these rules to ensure that your furry friend is able to enjoy the holidays, too!


