### YELLOW DOOR HANGERS: STREET SWEEP CODE ENFORCEMENT ADDRESSES STORM-WATER POLLUTING



Code Enforcement has requested that we make you aware of an upcoming Street Sweep they will be conducting this Spring and again in the Fall.

As a reminder from the March-April 2022 FH Newsletter, each property owner is responsible for the "drain area" in front of their house. Typically, this is about a 3 - 5 foot area from the curb - depending on your street and drainage.

It is up to the homeowner to keep this area clear of debris (leaves, grass clippings, litter, etc.) that will wash down the city storm drain. From here the storm-water, along with the debris, makes its way to White Rock Creek and the Trinity River.

In the past when debris has built up and blocked the stormwater sewer, it caused severe flooding in parts of our neighborhood on several streets such as San Leandro, San Cristobal, Eustis and Whittier to name a few.

REMINDER: Property owners, or someone you hire to take care of your property, who directly or indirectly cause waste to end up in the storm drain may be subject to fines up to \$2000.

Code Enforcement will be checking for debris up and down our streets. If they see a problem in front of your address, they will be hanging a Courtesy Yellow Door Hanger to remind you of your responsibility to clean this area up. The homeowner will have 10 days to address the issue at which time Code Enforcement will be back to make sure it has been resolved. If it hasn't, an Official Notice of Violation will be left for the homeowner. Once again, Code Enforcement will come back in 10 days and if it's not taken care of, will issue an Official Citation.

Please do your part to keep our Forest Hills streets clean and our storm drains clear of debris. Our waterways will thank you!

### **DID YOU KNOW?**

Did you know current members of the Forest Hills Security Program are eligible to use our Home Watch Program? If you are away on vacation or your home is under construction or vacant, an ENP officer will check on your home to be sure everything is safe each shift someone is on patrol. Please submit your Home Watch Request Form at

least 7 days prior to the start of the watch time period. The form can be found on foresthillssecurity.org or you can request a form by emailing fhspenp@aol.com

There is no limit to the number of times you may use the program throughout the year, however the length of each request is limited to 21 days. If an extended watch is needed, the household must be at least a silver level member (\$350 and above).



Her studio looks out across a semi-wild landscape of swooping beds. Winding rock pathways beckon a stroll through blooming native perennials. A lovely screened in porch is decked out in a lovely combination of

finishes. And a look into Sue's studio reveals world class creations in the making. A visit to this backyard is truly a feast for the eyes and food for the creative soul.



#### YARD of the MONTH

#### **MARCH 2022**

#### 8255 Santa Clara Drive Nicole & Brandon Ross

The graceful grove of cedar elms stood tall against the wrecking ball when the Rosses built their dream home in Forest Hills. It nestles into the Cedar Elm tree canopy "blending in with nature". They have transformed this long-neglected property into a modern Forest Hills jewel.

The contemporary landscape is big on style: A Blue Tongue Agave in a distressed metal planter, anchors the walkway. Feathery Mulley grasses soften the zigzagging approach while cascading Rosemary-filled containers shield the yard from the stark black driveway.

Nicole's "Texas Heat Lovers", spring blooming Desert Willows, red Salvias, purple Vitex and orange Coral Vine provide pops of color and attract pollinators and wildlife. "I love sitting out here in the evenings watching the owls and hawks, red buntings,



hummingbirds...." she says. Although many plants go dormant in winter, the Palmettos, Yuccas and Rosemary continue to thrive seeming impervious to hard freezes.

In the Ross' backyard, multiple seating and lounging options grace the swimming pool area. A stretch of lovely lawn and trees border one side of the pool. On the other, a fabulous Cabana houses a bar/ grill, an outdoor living room with fireplace & big screen tv and bath. It can easily accommodate a party of 40, or 150 when they open the sliding glass doors on the back and front of the house.

#### YARD of the MONTH

#### **APRIL 2022**

#### 1414 SAN RAFAEL John Spieker

When John Spieker bought the little ranch house the yard was "scraggly", but its trees were breathtaking. When the house was renovated in



2019, a woodland garden was designed to complement the new home's contemporary style. "The trees really are the backbone of this yard," John explains. His favorites include two craggy Cedar Elms, and a luscious Eastern Juniper in the backyard. In the front yard, Japanese Maples, killed by last years' winter storm, were replaced with more tolerant Bur Oaks.

The backyard nature-lovers garden is filled with an array of plant species that thrive with low maintenance. The xeriscaped beds by the driveway, the reclaimed cement blocks used in the walkways, the drip irrigation beds, all reflect a deep respect for our environment, as do the recycled water cistern and limited grassy areas. The back porch covered in Oklahoma flagstone provides a perfect perch for enjoying the natural-looking landscape. A casual fire pit area and raised planters for John's herb garden complete the easy living feel of the porch.

Walk down into the garden for a closer look at some of John's favorite shade-loving plants and take a peek into his woodworking shop at the end of the yard.

Each year the landscape is reviewed and renewed with expert advice. Recent additions include the Beauty Berry bushes and Gingko tree along the sidewalk. There's always something to enjoy in this carefully planned, but very natural feeling garden space. It is truly one of our woodland jewels.

### INVASIVE POISON HEMLOCK MAY BE COMING TO A PARK OR YARD NEAR YOU



Poison hemlock, an invasive species, is a widespread toxic biennial plant in the Carrot Family often found in open sunny areas, fields, vacant lots, and on roadsides. Hemlock, which resembles Queen Anne's Lace, is spreading quickly from rural areas to populated areas and could already be in your gardens.

Poison hemlock has a musty, unpleasant odor associated with alkaloids. It grows two to ten feet tall, and all parts of the plant are toxic. Eating even a small amount of any part of this plant can kill people, wildlife, livestock and pets and there is no antidote. Eating the plant is the main danger, but it is also toxic to the skin and respiratory system.

The stems are ribbed and hollow with purplish streaks or splotches. Poison hemlock reproduces by seeds that fall near the plant and disperse via fur, birds, water, and, to a limited extent, wind. When hemlock flowers, each individual plant can produce over 30,000 seeds.

IF you discover it in your garden, be sure you are wearing protective gear such as gloves, goggles, long sleeves and pants before working to control it.

### IT'S THAT TIME OF YEAR

When more of us are out walking, jogging, biking around our beautiful neighborhood. We have been asked to send out a few reminders:

- For safety, walk/jog facing oncoming traffic. This is the opposite of the recommendation for a bicyclist.
- Watch for inattentive drivers. You have the ability to see what the driver is doing such as looking in the backseat or down at their cell phone.
- Avoid staring at your cell phone.
- Do not wear earbuds or headphones so you can hear traffic. At least leave one ear uncovered, so you can enjoy your music and still hear traffic.
- $\cdot$   $\,$  At night, it's best to walk with a friend.
- Wear light colored clothing when it is dark.
- Wear reflective gear/clothing patches or stripes.

### When out walking with your furry buddies, please remember to:

- Always carry poop bags AND dispose of properly. Do not just toss in someone's yard or the gutter. Picking up your dog's poop is more than just being a good, tidy neighbor - dog poop that isn't picked up can cause major health concerns to humans and pets alike. Pet waste may contain harmful organisms such as giardia, E. coli, roundworms, hookworms, and salmonella that can spread to other animals and humans or make their way into the soil and pollute water supplies.
- Check that your pet's collar is not too tight or too lose.
- Be sure your pet wears up-to-date tags with your correct contact information and has microchipped and registered.
- If you're going to be walking for more than a half hour or out in the hot weather bring plenty of water along for your dog.
- Watch out for hot pavement in the summer.
  Place your hand or bare foot on the pavement for 5 seconds. If it's too hot (or uncomfortable) for your skin, it's too hot for your dog's feet.
- Always ask before approaching other dogs with yours. Just because your dog is friendly doesn't mean every dog-to-dog meeting will be pleasant. There are plenty of dogs that don't do well with on a leash greeting.
- For those late-night walks, be sure your pet also has some type of reflective item on such as a collar or leash.
