

THE BIG DIG



The City of Dallas is performing a major wastewater main replacement in the **neighborhood.** This project will affect traffic patterns on San Rafael, San Fernando Way and St. Francis over the next year. Please be patient as you navigate through the neighborhood. The project is currently underway at White Rock and San Fernando which is affecting those residents in the 8100 and 8200 blocks of San Fernando Way. This is a BIG project. This wastewater main is 30 inches in diameter and is located 20-30 feet below the street surface. It routes through Forest Hills from the Arboretum area, down San Fernando Way and back to Garland Road from San Rafael. It will be an inconvenience, but is a critical need if the area wants to have a failsafe sewer service.

We will keep you updated on the progress and any additional information received from the City or its contractor.

2023 FHNA Membership Letter



Dear Forest Hills Neighbors -

As we begin the New Year, you may be wondering how you can best support our wonderful neighborhood that we call home. Filled with tree-lined streets and friendly neighbors, Forest Hills has been around for almost 100 years! In order for us to continue to keep the neighborhood beautiful as well as offer a variety of events, we need your support. It's time to **Spring into Action!**

Membership is the fastest and easiest way to support the neighborhood. Your membership fees go towards neighborhood beautification, such as median tree trimming, social events, and providing neighborhood communication to you via emails and the newsletter. We have historically tried to keep membership fees low to keep them accessible for each neighbor. Based on the feedback from last year's survey, two of the main priorities that were common amongst neighbors were both median tree maintenance and more social events, including adding some events just for adults. In order for us to provide these things, as well as fund our 100-year celebration, we are making a nominal increase in membership fees starting in 2023.

Annual membership fees will increase to \$75 per household and \$45 for +65 households. Membership fees can be paid either via check or online through our website. And starting this year, payment options will be processed through LumaPay, which allows payments with credit and debit cards, ACH debits, and Apple, and Google Pay. In addition to providing funds to support the efforts of the FHNA, annual membership gives you access to our online directory. Our online directory can be accessed via the FHNA website or with the QR Code below.

As part of our **Spring into Action!** campaign, households who pay their membership fees by March 20th, the first day of spring, will be entered into a drawing for a \$100 gift card to the restaurant of their choice.

In addition to financial support, the FHNA needs volunteers to help with our various committees. Volunteering is not only a great way to support the neighborhood, but also to meet some of your neighbors. Volunteering can be as simple as helping to set up for a single event, or a more involved ongoing responsibility such as managing beautification sponsorships in the neighborhood. Another reason why our neighborhood needs a Security Program:

6 Our Dallas Police Department is down 700 Officers and due to that man power reduction DPD evaluates the crime in all areas of Dallas to determine which high risk areas need an officer more.

> The Forest Hills neighborhood does not have a high crime rate, due to its strong security patrol program. Thus your assigned neighborhood on duty beat officer is reassigned to areas in the NE division that have higher crime rates and heavy 911 call loads. Consequently, if an incident occurs in Forest Hills, the only DPD Officer available to respond is one of your FHSP-ENP officers if they are on duty. Just another reason why you need this program and to continue to support it. 99

The Planning and Zoning committee keeps residents apprised and informed of issues that affect our neighborhood. Over the past year, we've had one high profile zoning case and several ongoing public and provide construction projects: The City Council approved the zoning variances requested by Mill Creek, the developer for the former Lot/Local Traveler site. Site work has begun this month and we should start to see meaningful progress on the mixed-use multifamily and retail development by summer 2023. Construction on the 3G intersection is underway and inevitably frustrations are running high. The process takes time to re-route utilities, widen bridge underpasses and construct new bridges and roadways. The quiet zone infrastructure has been completed at the rail crossings at Highland Rd. St. Francis and Lakeland Dr. We are waiting on the State and Federal government sign off before the quiet zones are in effect.

The Santa Fe/White Rock Trail expansion is underway along the railroad tracks with the most noticeable construction being on the Highland Road side. The single-family development on the former mobile home park site at Barbaree and Highland Rd is underway. The developer has some unique designs and layouts that preserve the tree canopy while providing modern living in a pedestrian friendly environment. Watch for more progress on that in 2023. And last but not least, the Big Dig Wastewater Main replacement that happens to travel 30 feet below the streets of St. Francis, San Fernando Way and San Rafael is underway. This is a much needed utility improvement but a hassle for the neighbors affected by it. Hopefully they will be finished by 2024 and you'll forget they were even there, except then you will no longer smell the sewer discharge leak at Garland and San Rafael.

Newcomer's Party Recap



eet Ruth Parker, "Ms. P" as her neighbors call her, our very own Forest Hills Centenarian!

Ruth was born on February 9, 1923 and grew up on her Wilson family farm near Brownwood, TX. After graduation from her hometown college, Howard Payne University, she began her teaching career (grades 1-8). She met the love of her life, Vernon Parker while teaching in Odessa. It was there they married and started a family. They eventually moved to Paris and then Sulfur Springs for her husband's new business venture. When it failed, Ruth pushed on with optimism saying, "I would love to live in Dallas and it's big enough that we will certainly find jobs." Sure enough they did.

The Parkers moved to the Casa View area first and later in 1972, Vernon saw a house for sale in Forest Hills. He loved this beautiful neighborhood with all its trees and bought that 3,600 sq ft house, which was one of first houses built here in the 20's for \$35,000! At the time this was a \$50,000 neighborhood, but the place needed a lot of work as the previous family had 8 kids and several dogs. Interesting that the house and Ruth were both built in 1923!

The importance of education, church attendance, and belief in God stressed by her mother greatly influenced Ruth's educational choices and religious values all of her life.

Ruth loved teaching. She still feels it is a profession as honorable as being a doctor. While teaching here in Dallas, she saw a brochure about a SMU scholarship offered by Ross Perot. Tuition, books, and even gas were paid for! She hesitated only a second, applied and got it! She worked hard studying while Vernon lent a helping hand around the house and with the children. Ruth graduated with a master's degree in education with a specialty in reading in 1977, 30 years after her bachelor's degree in 1947! She taught school for over 42 years, ending her career at George W. Truett Elementary at Gross and Peavey.

Ms. P has always had a yearning to travel. After they moved to Dallas, she planned as long as 6-week trips each summer. Vernon, having grown weary of traveling while in the Air Force, opted to stay home with the kids. She visited 30 countries with her favorites being Switzerland and Australia. Her last trip not long ago was to Africa with her daughter, Carole. One regret is she wishes she could have traveled to the Holy Land. Ruth proudly displays a large framed world map with color push pins marking her explorations.

Retirement did not slow down Ruth. If anything she went into high gear. She continued traveling in the summer. She had always been an avid reader. (Her still all-time favorite book is *Gone with the Wind*.) Charlie, her son in Austin, used to say that "Mom is out clubbing again." She joined a book club, garden club, bridge club, bible study club and of course continued attending Shiloh Terrace Baptist Church faithfully on Sundays. When she wasn't doing all that, she



would be in the yard for hours daily gardening, planting, pruning and weeding.

There have been so many changes, discoveries, inventions and historical events in these last 100 years. Ruth feels the greatest advance in her century has been in computer technology. She is astounded by our ability to find answers and learn through an instant search on the web. She isn't able to use the computer, but constantly when family and friends are near and a question arises, she asks them to Google it!

She loves her Forest Hills neighbors and connecting with them at the yearly block parties. She is blessed with good neighbors all around her. Her definition of a good neighbor is one, who looks out for their fellow neighbors and has their best interest at heart. She uses Pat Cage as the perfect example. "She seems to always show up miraculously just knowing when there is a need." The two of them these days spend time talking daily about current events, politics, health and family. They laugh a lot. Ruth refers to her often as "Precious Pat."

Vikki Espinosa and her two boys are who she thinks are other examples of good neighbors. Several years ago, the boys started helping Ruth take the trash out, water plants and do other chores. Their "Mrs. Ruth" wanted to pay them, but Vikki advised against it as she wanted her children to know that giving does not have a cash reward and to feel the true rewards of helping others. Ruth can't resist giving them a little tip though!

When asked what she attributes her longevity to she answers, "No cigarettes, no drugs, no alcohol, and eating right, but I must admit I prefer sugar over vegetables!"

Tree of Life Program Expands to Forest Hills Neighbors

In November, high school senior Katrena Kolner led the Friends of the Warren Ferris Cemetery Tree of Life Program to transplant 20 native saplings from the Ferris Cemetery at local schools. Seven schools participated, sending 12 students who potted the saplings, replanted them on their school grounds and will care for them as they become accustomed to their new home.

In honor of Susanne Starling, our respected resident historian and avid supporter of the cemetery restoration program who recently passed, the FWFC would like to extend this program to all members of the FWFC community by making other native saplings available for transplanting.

Species available include Texas Redbud, Cedar Elm, Red Oak, American Beautyberry, Hackberry, Chittamwood and Eastern Red Cedar.

Saplings range in size from 1' – 6', depending on the size of the chosen sapling. Allow approximately 30 minutes to dig out the root-ball/tree and place it in a pot for transportation to your site. You are welcome to bring your gardener, though the act itself is a rejuvenating connection to the native environment that will transfer to your own yard.

The FWFC can provide containers for transplanting, has tools available and will provide guidance on successful transplanting. For their 2022 Awards Program, GSDFW selected Julie Fineman, Forest Hills resident and founder/Board Member of the Friends of the Warren Ferris Cemetery non-profit, as their Coke Buchanan Volunteer of the Year. In the Conservation Activist category, nominees

for this award exhibited exemplary action in Leadership, Environmental Impact and Community Impact. Julie's contribution to conceptualizing and developing the FWFC natural habitat program honoring the pioneers buried in the historic cemetery, touches on all of these categories as the interwoven benefits of the cemetery program have developed and become reality.

Named after noted regional activist Coke Buchanan, the Award embodies the volunteer-led culture that has made the FWFC successful in transforming a neglected cemetery site into a wildlife habitat and neighborhood amenity.

Launched in 2011, the GSDFW educational website was created by the Memnosyne Institute, a Dallas-based nonprofit, to educate the community on environmental topics including green living, sustainability, conservation, environmental advocacy and public policy discussions. Green Source DFW continues to advance the North Texas green movement through original reporting, feature articles, green business and nonprofit listings, a green jobs board and a green event calendar and since 2019, an Apple podcast called the Texas Green Report, aimed at a state-wide audience.

With over 250,000 unique visitors annually and 6,000 subscribers to its weekly newsletter, the GSDFW site provides connectivity for the region's environmental movement. In honoring Julie's personal contribution, and by extension the benefits of the FWFC program, GSDFW has shown recognition and validation for the impact that local initiatives can have on the environmental and communal health of their host communities.

The GSDFW awards ceremony was held on Dec. 4th at the Ft. Worth Botanic Garden.

As we head into the new year filled with hope, followed by February, the month of love, I have a love story which will leave you full of hope!

Four years ago, I worked for a local shelter when a severe cruelty case came in. The embedded collar Bella wore almost touched her spine and had to be surgically removed. She was starving and it was not known if she would make it. She made it through the surgery and the rehab begun.

Bella endured an uphill battle from the beginning. Several of the staff considered her a huge liability and a danger to society due to the abuse she encountered and some of her reactivity behavior. I thought differently! I have been taught, if you change your mind about the animal, the animal changes. I worked endless hours with Bella to help her succeed in the outside world. She went to "committee" several times for euthanasia, each time several of us would write board members and large donors and each time we succeeded in keeping Bella alive.

I left the shelter two years ago and was not allowed to see Bella after I left. I was heartbroken and tried several different avenues to get her out. Each time I was met with resistance and even got people fired who tried to help.

A few months ago Bella finally received clearance for adoption to the "right" home and environment. No one fit the bill. So, once again, in October, she was going to committee for euthanasia for length of stay and quality of life. I got a text three days before she was to be considered for euthanasia saying we were her only hope. That was the day we finally brought her home and now our family is truly complete.

Bella reminds me daily to never give up and always have hope!
