WARREN FERRIS CEMETERY: A FUTURE AS WELL AS A PAST

Segment 2 features an interview with Susanne Starling, Warren Ferris historian, educator and biographical author of Land is the Cry by Dallas historian Mike Hazel, Editor of Legacy Magazine. Ms. Starling recounts her journey researching the history of Warren Ferris, the original surveyor of Dallas County. The interview chronicles the rise of Dallas as a "quite a little town," the eventual vandalism of the cemetery in the 20th Century, the historic marker installed in 1985, the cemetery's 2016 designation as a Texas Historic Cemetery and finally its current beautification program and the research being performed by Remembering Black Dallas on the people buried in the cemetery.

Segment 3 features Chris Freeman,
Professional Land Surveyor, of Lina T. Ramey
& Associates and Chris Bohannan, Director of
Collections for the Dallas Historical Society.
They share details about Ferris as surveyor and the
adversity faced in surveying Dallas and Dallas
County in the mid 1800's. The discussion includes
a demonstration of the type of equipment that
would have been used by Warren Ferris. This
segment was shot at the Old Red Museum which
now has similar survey equipment on display.
