ALLEY OOPS!

City cracks down on FH alley debris and obstruction!!

We are not sure who is making more noise about the alleys in Forest Hills, residents, or the City.

An average of 2 calls a week are logged from FH residents upset over the City's new crackdown on cleaner, clearer alleys. Some residents have actually received citations for unsightly debris. This constitutes anything from rose bushes, to foliage overhang or bulging bags of trash.

The city wants the alley ways of FH to be cleaned up. The reason? As noted in the October Reporter Issue, the city has embarked on a huge water line replacement project. The alley ways must be clear for huge city trucks to maneuver. The city also states concern over the ability of emergency vehicles to get down the narrow alley corriders.

The city is serious! One resident had to lop off her lovely and thriving rose bushes to meet compliance codes. Now that is frustrating!! You'd think adding some beauty to the alley would be a good thing given the general lack of attention most alley's get.

If you need information about your alley call Casandra Hamilton at city hall at this number: 214-671-0591. We're told they are happy to answer questions you may have about what you have growing or looming behind your home in the alley.


Also, there has been plenty of crime reported due to alley access to garages. To be on the safe side, button things up. Check your alley frequently, not just on garbage pick-up day. If you find anything out of order, or suspicious, report it.

Concern is also growing over the amount of trash pitched in the alleys that is not bagged or disposed of properly. All trash must be properly bagged and tied and placed in the large gray city receptical.

Any resident not in compliance is at risk for a citation. Citations can range from \$50 - \$200. In the Spirit of Forest Hills . . . let's keep things tidy!!



FOREST HILLS SECURITY NEWS

FHSP Patrols

Every time a Forest Hills Security Program (FHSP) officer patrols our neighborhood, he or she checks previously filed crime reports from Forest Hills and the surrounding area, which have been compiled by the Northeast Division of the Dallas Police Dept. The officer also checks the FHSP logbook for notes from other patrols regarding previous activity in our neighborhood. This information gives the police officer more focus on what has been occurring, which areas



should be patrolled more thoroughly and which neighbors have made reports in order to follow up. Other services include accessing with homeowners their property offering safety/security tips as well as out of town house checks when FHSP members request the service. All uniformed officers are in marked Dallas Police vehicles with onboard computers to access information quickly. These officers and their activities are fully insured under the City of Dallas.

Patrols are pre-scheduled at varying times to parallel when crime has happened or has a potential to occur. Each patrol time and its activity including all traffic stops, calls made, houses checked and any detailed observations made by the officers are documented by them into a logbook.

Two of Forest Hills four officers have been with the program since its inception in September 2003 and the ther two officers have been in our neighborhood over a year. We are fortunate to have very senior experienced officers who care about our neighborhood.

Currently there are 5 patrols per week, which give the neighborhood 20+ hours of coverage weekly (168 hours). More patrols are added during the holidays or for special events, which are pulled hours from weeks before or after the holidays. The goal this year is to increase to six patrols a week bringing us up to 24+ hours of coverage during a week. We can reach this goal with more participates in this program.


PIPELINE INSTALLATION TIMELINE

He says patrolling Forest Hills takes him back to the days of police work when street officers took pride in the care of their beat and knew most of the people in the area.


Johnny Baker

We are so fortunate having these outstanding officers working with us!




ANNUAL FALL FESTIVAL - HUGE HIT

REALTOR'S CORNER

More Speculation -Building Trends

New homes are sprouting up on old lots faster and faster in our Forest Hills neighborhood. Many are custom built homes where the homeowner tears down the existing structure on their lot and designs and builds their own new home. Recently, however, we have seen a large increase in "Spec" (speculative) homes. Builders are buying up lots and tearing down the homes that are currently there in order to design and build a home that will, hopefully, appeal to a prospective buyer. The hope of the builder is that many of these spec homes will be sold during the construction phase so that the new purchaser will have the opportunity to choose much of the desired finish-out. You might be wondering how many of these spec homes are actually

selling. Presently, there are approximately twelve spec homes either in the pre-construction phase, currently under construction, or recently completed and on the market. Of these, there have been no published sales to date for these properties.

There have been at least four homes that have sold over \$1,000,000 this year in our neighborhood. Three out of four of these were the resale of newer homes that were built in the last ten years. Sales of higher priced properties in Forest Hills and Lakewood that have been completely remodeled or are new homes have been on the rise lately.

The required setbacks in Forest Hills pose another hot topic for neighbors that are remodeling as well as new construction. A detailed explanation of our neighborhoods Planned Development District and zoning will be discussed in an upcoming newsletter.

ADOPT-A-MEDIAN PROGRAM

The Forest Hills Association will establish an *Adopt-a-Median* Program in an effort to restore, beautify and maintain the median and alleys within Forest Hills. The program will work in conjunction with the Forest Hills Garden Club.

It is the mission of the Adopt-a-Median Program to make a viable, sustainable impact on the lives of Forest Hills residents and the neighborhood in which they live. Through active partnerships with neighborhood organizations, residents, youth, businesses, schools, churches, and government we will engage people in beautifying Forest Hills, improving the quality of the environment and fostering pride in our neighborhood.

Who

The Forest Hills Association will secure *Adopters* - the Forest Hills Association, the Forest Hills Security Program, the Forest Hills Garden Club, businesses, churches, organizations, and individuals - to donate funds and, if desired, work alongside the Forest Hills Association in the median - removing trash, planing etc.

Forest Hills residents are encouraged to adopt the median area in front of their homes. If they do not have a median in front of their home, they will be encouraged to adopt a section of unadopted median elsewhere in the neighborhood.

What?

Adopters will make an initial donation (minimum of \$50) to the Forest Hills Association Beautification and Restoration Committee. This donation will offset the expenses of the Adopt-A-Median Program.

FOREST HILLS CHILDREN'S NETWORK

This program was established 5 years ago. Its original purpose was to help unite kids in Forest Hills. The reason? They attend a variety of different schools. Other neighborhoods have similar network programs for the same reason.
