Spotlight On....

Crime Rate Drops

In a month-to-month study from 1999, our crime started a significant decline the month after we started the ENP program in September 2003. Since that month, we have had an overall drop in our crime rate of 50%! In 2004, The City of Dallas had a decrease of 2% and the Northeast Division had a decrease of 11% overall, while our neighborhood's rate went down 39%. So far this year, Northeast is flat compared to 2004 and our neighborhood is down 10%. Our neighborhood appears to defy the crime trends and we want to thank each every one of you for your support with the Forest Hills Security program!

Despite these impressive results, we so strongly wish we could get the major crimes to "0." We've included crime stats in this newsletter for 2004 and January to May 2005. As reflected in the stats, there are several BMV, or burglaries of a motor vehicle. About 80% of these occur in the parking lots at the Arboretum and White Rock Lake that are included in our crime reporting areas.

You will also see that our neighborhood has had some burglaries. Some of these appear to be of the same fashion where the alarm system was by-passed by removing a pane of glass and entering the home without raising the window. In one case, there was substantial property loss, allowing a profile to be developed. This profile matched the description of a burglary suspect in Lakewood seen fleeing immediately after a home burglary in that neighborhood several weeks ago.

If you see any suspicious activity, please call 911 and provide the details to the operator. The 911 operators will log this information and our patrol officers will review and compare it to other reports received. This is the best way we can help the police solve these crimes and prevent future crimes.

Both the FH Security Program and the neighborhood homeowners' association are working closely together and in conjunction with our patrol officers to consistently reduce our crime. We will bring you details on crime prevention measures and other awareness programs to help ensure the safety and security of our neighborhood.

Tips for Home Safety and Security

Most crimes involving homes are crimes of opportunity. If the criminal feels he cannot safely commit the crime, he will look elsewhere where it is safe and more convenient.

Home Perimeter



Alleys can provide hiding places for a would-be burglar. High fences, concealed back yards, and only partially visible driveways can make a burglar very difficult to see.

Most home burglaries happen through the front door when no one is at home. Burglars also enter a residence through a back door or patio entrance, which many times are out of sight of the street or driveway. Make sure the gate allowing entrance to the back yard has a padlock. If no fence is in place make sure the trees and shrubs do not block the view of your home. Also make sure the back door has a double cylinder lock where a key must be used on each side. Adequate locks and highly visible entrances are the best deterrent against a burglar. For safety purposes when using double cylinder locks, insure that the home is equipped with enough battery-operated smoke detectors.

Garages are a huge convenience and provide a safe place to secure vehicles, tools, and lawn equipment. However, a poorly secured garage can provide a place for someone to hide and, in many cases, gain easy access into the house. Make the garage safe by insuring that all doors are locked with a strong deadbolt and that there is good outside lighting. Keep the garage doors closed as much as possible, even when you are home. An automatic garage door opener makes coming home safer. Additionally, a light and/or motion sensor should be attached to illuminate the alley, driveway, and backyard. By lighting the entire area you are making it less convenient for the criminal to hide and making your environment safer.

Place your numerical address in the back on the garage, the fence or the gate where it is highly visible from the alley. This will make it much easier for the police and other emergency vehicles to locate a specific residence and will make it harder for a criminal to escape.

Keep the alley as clean as possible. Accumulated trash can create a health hazard and an additional place to hide. It can also gives the impression that no one has been home for some time or it can send a signal that no one cares about the neighborhood.

Know your side, back and front neighbors. Be aware of their schedules and have their conta125 ct numbers. Tell them when you will be away. If you are a subscriber to ENP (extended neighborhood patrol), be sure to arrange for police house checks while you are away.

Pick up papers and door notices often, even when you are at home. In case of an extended stay out of town, arrange for a neighbor to keep the mail and newspapers out of sight. Newspapers in the yard, door notices and a full mailbox are open invitations to a burglar. Park your car or have a neighbor park one of theirs in the driveway to give the appearance that someone is home.

Try to park your locked car in the driveway rather than on the street. Make sure nothing is visible that might encourage a break-in. Never leave a child unattended even for a second in your car, even in your driveway. In Forest Hills, from 2000 to 2003, there has been a large increase of burglary of a motor vehicle (break-ins, not auto-theft). In 1999, a law went into effect changing that crime from a felony to a misdemeanor. Consequently this crime is on an upswing.

Home Exterior

All doors that lead to the outside should be made of metal or solid 1 3/4-inch hardwood with double cylinder locks. Hollow and light doors are fine for the interior of the house but these doors can be easily broken and are not suitable for a main entryway to the house. Each door should have a clearance of no more than 1/8-inch between the door and frame. A metal lining on the inside of the door can help prevent drilling, sawing, and kicking in from the outside. A metal strike plate will also help against a kick in.

Almost 50% of all burglars enter a residence through an unlocked door or a door with no lock at all. Deadbolt locks should have a minimum of a 1-inch bolt. Insure locks are also installed on screen doors, storm doors, patio doors, garage doors, and cellar doors. And, if there is an upstairs patio don't forget that door. Lock up every time you leave the residence, even if it's only for a short time.

Locks on doors should be at least 40 inches away from windows and any other potential openings such as a mail slot. This will make it almost impossible for a burglar to open an exterior door by reaching in from the outside. A double cylinder lock that has to be opened by a key from either side is the deadbolt of preference. Door hinges should be hidden so that the pin can't be removed from the outside, or use door pins.

Never hide keys on the outside of the house. Rather, leave any extra keys with a neighbor you can trust. The places a burglar will look for a key are under doormats, in flowerpots, and under rocks, not to mention the most obvious place of all, which is above the doorframe. Don't place any identification tags on keys or key rings; if lost, a potential burglar now has an open invitation to the house.

Window air conditioner units should be bolted to the inside wall of the room. There is also a commercially available devise that will prevent the window from being opened once it is lowered to the top of the air conditioner unit.

Sliding Glass doors should always be secured with commercially available bars and locks. A brooff handle that fits tight can also be put in the slide track. These types of doors are especially inviting to burglars because without a security device, the sliding door can be easily lifted off its track and opened. There are also commercially available locks for windows that accomplish the same level of security. Make sure that all windows are locked and secure when leaving the house. It is also a good idea to keep windows in rooms that are not occupied locked, even when the house itself is occupied.

Home Interior

Automatic timers to switch on and off lights at various times are also a good idea.

Leaving a TV or radio on while away can be a good deterrent. Do not give your house the look of being closed up for a vacation. Do not close drapes and shutters, which would otherwise be open. Remember that if a burglar does not think it is absolutely safe to enter a residence, he will continue past that house and look elsewhere.



Professionally installed security systems are always of concern to the homeowner. The major concern is whether security systems are worth the initial investment cost and the monthly maintenance fee. Homeowners must make that decision based on the level of safety each is comfortable with. The primary advantage to a security system is that when there is an attempt to enter the property, the alarm sounds and the intruder flees from the scene, usually before entry to the house. The alarm is heard in the house and throughout the immediate neighborhood. At the same time, a signal is sent to the alarm monitoring company, which in turn notifies the police department. The police patrol is dispatched as quickly as possible depending upon availability. In addition, if our neighborhood patrol is on duty, the officer will hear the dispatch and can be there immediately.

Coming home, entering your home and knowing you will not surprise or be surprised by a criminal is comforting. The other advantages to an alarm system are the wireless emergency button, which is portable and can be used anywhere in the house or outside your home and the ability to turn the system on while you are sleeping. Many alarms have a smoke detector. This can be beneficial not only while you are in the home, but also while you are away, as it alerts the fire department immediately. Some insurance companies give discounts to their customers who have a security system.

If you do have a security system, please use it! In several Forest Hills reported residential break-ins where there was a security system, the alarm was not on!

When considering a plan for residential security, remember that all of these separate, sometimes expensive, sometimes small and trivial safety devises and precautions, when incorporated as a whole, will be a very effective deterrent to even the most accomplished burglar.



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
